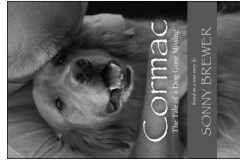
THE SIEGE OF MECCA: The Forgotten Uprising in Islam's Hallowed Shrine and the Birth of al-Qaeda, by Yaroslav Trofimov (Doubleday, \$26.97, 80385519250/0385519257) "As the Iranian Revolution of 1979 unfolded next door, the Saudis were alarmed and embarrassed by an armed takeover of the Grand Mosque in Mecca in 1979. The counter-siege of Islam's holiest shrine dragged on into bloody absurdity, revealing corruption and incompetence in the highest levels of the Saudi government. 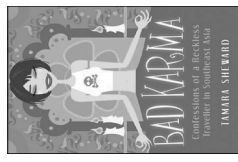

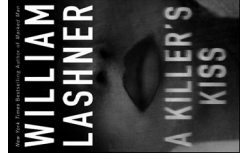
