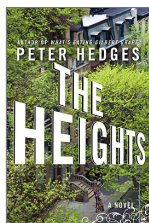

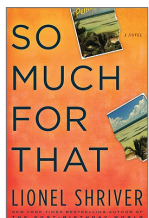
**The Heights**

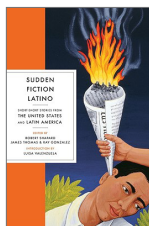
**A Novel, by Lionel Shriver**

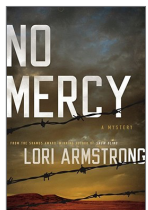
**False Mermaid**

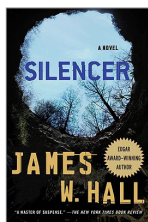

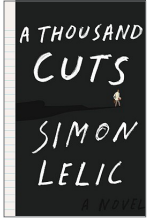

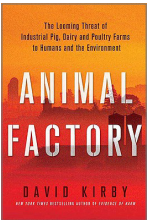


**A Thousand Cuts**
